Listen to the sounds around you (a dog barking, a car whirring) and imitate them!	Put things in order. Try large to small, or small to large. Stack bowls or measuring cups.	Play I Spy! What colours can you find?	Play a simple board game like snakes and ladders or put together a puzzle.	Tell your child a story about when you were young!	Look out your front window and ask your child to tell you about what they see.	Imitate my babbling sounds and actions. These "conversations" kick start language.
